

## Mobile Learning Week Policy Forum

*Harnessing e-skills and mobile learning for inclusive sustainable development*

**The Policy Forum will examine the changing e-skills required in societies increasingly dependent on digital technologies. Participants will consider how e-skills and the growing ubiquity of mobile technology can enable learning that advances progress towards the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, including in contexts of emergencies and crises.**

As digital technologies become increasingly central to work and education, learning the skills to leverage them has never been more important. Recent analysis shows that within developed economies 90% of jobs require at least some level of e-skills, despite the fact that more than one third of the labour force has an extremely limited ability to use information and communication technology (ICT) productively. Without e-skills, people are at risk of social and economic exclusion. They have difficulty accessing information, services and mobile learning content that can open doors to education and employment.

The Policy Forum will help to clarify the interrelations between e-skills, mobile learning, employment, protection and inclusion. Mobile learning is both reliant on e-skills and a vehicle for the development of these skills. E-skills can foster the creativity and innovation needed in knowledge societies and catalyze desirable social and economic change.

Forum participants including Ministers of Education, Ministers of ICT, and representatives from the private sector will discuss how e-skills and mobile learning can help achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly SDG4: 'Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all'. They will share experiences of successful e-skills and mobile learning initiatives and outline strategies to create synergies between national policies in the areas of technology, education, telecommunications and innovation.

In alignment with the 'Education in emergencies and crisis' theme of Mobile Learning Week 2017, the Forum will give special attention to policies, partnerships and strategies that help vulnerable groups, including refugees and other displaced people.

The Forum will be co-organized by UNESCO and ITU, in close collaboration with UNHCR.
