AFRICA REGIONAL INITIATIVES

- WTDC-06, Doha, 7-15 March 2006 (Doha Action plan)
- Comprehensive package to enable developing countries to promote equitable and sustainable development of ICT networks and services.
- It consists of five regional initiative, six programmes, two activities and special initiative to be implemented by the ITU, (BDT), over four years.

AFRICA REGIONAL INITIATIVES

WTDC-06 5 RI for Africa: The region puts priorities on five initiatives;

- Human and Institutional capacity building
- Strengthening and harmonizing policy and regulatory frameworks for integration of African ICT markets
- Development of a broadband infrastructure and achievement of regional interconnectivity
- ICT applications
- Introduction of new digital broadcasting technologies

AFRICA REGIONAL INITIATIVES

- Objectives Development of a broadband infrastructure and achievement of Regional interconnectivity
 - 1. Needs assessment for technical support to various connectivity infrastructure projects.
 - 2. Assess existing Internet nodes, traffic and the need for Sub-region Internet Exchange points.
 - 3. Analyze existing relations and routings used for roaming between countries.
 - 4. Collect and compile available data including respective projects for the streamlined broadband infrastructure proposed for the sub-regions.

AFRICA REGIONAL INITIATIVES

- Objectives- Cont'd
 - a) Undertake complementary technical and economical feasibility studies to identify the appropriate carriers for LDCs and landlocked countries..
 - b) Produce the final configuration of the broadband network.
 - c) Prepare specifications for the implementation of the interconnection of Internet nodes
 - d) Provide assistance to countries, where necessary during the various engineering phases.
 - e) Develop benchmarks for tariffs for ICT service for African countries
 - f) Establish an MoU between the various operators for mutual recognition of roaming users

Connect Africa Summit Goals

- **Goal 1:** Interconnect all African capitals and major cities with ICT broadband infrastructure and strengthen connectivity to the rest of the world by 2012.
- Goal 2: Connect African villages to broadband ICT services by 2015 and implement shared access initiatives such as community telecentres and village phones.

Connect Africa Summit Goals

Goal 3: Adopt key regulatory measures that promote affordable, widespread access to a full range of broadband ICT services, including

- technology and service neutral licensing/authorization practices,
- allocating spectrum for multiple, competitive broadband wireless service providers,
- creating national Internet Exchange Points (IXPs) and implementing competition in the provision of international Internet connectivity.

Connect Africa Summit Goals

Goal 4: Support the development of a critical mass of ICT skills required by the knowledge economy, notably through

- the establishment of a network of ICT Centres of Excellence in each sub-region of Africa and
- ICT capacity-building and training centres in each country,

with the aim of achieving a broad network of inter-linked physical and virtual centres, while ensuring coordination between academia and industry by 2015.

Goal 5: Adopt a national e-strategy, including a cyber-security framework, and

 deploy at least one flagship egovernment service as well as eeducation, e-commerce and e-health services
