Roland Yaw Kudozia, an experienced telecommunications engineer from Ghana, has established a significant presence in the industry through his expertise in regulations, system design, operations, and standards. His career is distinguished by his leadership in licensing, standards, technical regulations, and policy development within Ghana's telecommunications sector.

Roland began his academic journey at Prempeh College, Kumasi, Ghana, where he studied Science and Mathematics. He then pursued a Diploma in Telecommunication Engineering at Multimedia University in Malacca, Malaysia, laying the foundational knowledge for his career. His quest for deeper technical expertise led him to earn a Bachelor of Engineering in Electronics & Communication from All Nations University. To further his proficiency in managing technology-driven business environments, Roland obtained a Master's in Business Administration from Nicosia University, Cyprus, and a Master's in Technology and Innovation focusing on Electronic Security and Risk Management from Aspen University. He capped his academic pursuits with a Doctor of Science in Computer Science from Aspen University.

Roland currently serves as the Head of the Licensing Unit at the National Communications Authority in Accra. His role involves coordinating the development of license documents and providing guidelines for the deployment of new telecommunication services.

Previously, Roland was the Head of Standards and Technical Regulations at the same authority. In this capacity, he led the national committee for ICT/Telecommunication Standards and was responsible for Ghana's Type Approval Regime, development of Type Approval Guidelines and Regulation. His work has significantly contributed to the review and amendment of telecommunications licenses and the national electronic communication numbering plan.

Beyond his national contributions, Roland has been actively involved with the work of the International Telecommunication Union (ITU). Roland was a former Vice Chair of Study Group 2. Roland has since 2018 been coordinating and facilitating workshops on C&I matters for the ITU Africa region. He has authored contributions to the Type Approval process and delivered international presentations on ICT Conformance and Interoperability challenges faced by developing countries.
