

Karl A. Kensinger is a Deputy Chief of the Satellite Division of the Federal Communications Commission's International Bureau. He began his career at the FCC in 1987 in the FCC's Mass Media Bureau, regulating radio and television. In 1994, he joined the FCC's then newly formed International Bureau, where he served as an attorney, as the Chief of the Satellite Division's Satellite Engineering Branch, and as a Special Advisor and then Associate Chief of the Satellite Division, before assuming his current position as Deputy Chief.

Mr. Kensinger experience includes work on a broad range of satellite policy and licensing matters, including radio spectrum policy and transfers of FCC licenses. He has been the primary FCC point of contact on orbital debris matters since 1995, and was instrumental in the FCC's adoption of orbital debris mitigation rules in 2004. He is also a focal point for FCC small satellite licensing activities.

Mr. Kensinger is an attorney. He is a 1985 graduate of the University of Michigan Law School and a 1982 graduate of the University of Chicago.
