Creating effective action -- engage the private sector and civil society

- □ A "development summit" targeted on the MDGs cannot ignore the need for partnership between government, the private sector, civil society
- Should identify specific needs for international cooperation as well as general principles for the stakeholders
- □ Elements of a coherent e-strategy include:
 - Government must create the regulatory framework and the environment for investment and entrepreneurship
 - Specific initiatives by government, international agencies or donors can only be leveraged into mass participation in global information society by the commitment of the private sector
